There are no formal activities planned, just our usual community conversations and shared brotherhood/sisterhood.



Last Sunday

The crowd gathering on Sunday April 2nd warmly welcomed Jonathan Daly-LaBelle, local peace activist and ARC supporter. Jonathan organizes Just Peace RI and follows the state legislature closely, especially when there are bills about the military. He travels across the state with banners and flyers calling attention to the bloated military spending. In fact on the last Friday of each month he and other Westerly activists demonstrate against the war machine at the intersection of Rt. 1 and Rt. 78 from 12–1:30 in front of CVS. Feel free to join them any time.

This week Jonathan informed us of a bill that was being introduced in the House that would change the name of Victory (VJ) Day to <u>Peace and Remembrance Day</u>. Rhode Island is the only state that continues to celebrate August 15. 1945 the day Japan surrendered the U.S. dropped two atomic bombs

on Japan. It commemorates one of the most devastating and horrific events of WWII. The innocent people of Japan who suffered this horrendous tragedy and their descendants do not need to be reminded of this moment. By renaming this day to Peace and Remembrance Day we remind ourselves of the desire for world peace while honoring all those soldiers and civilians who perished during that time.

Jonathan asked all those in attendance to write to send emails in support of House Bill 5452. This is exactly why our Sunday gatherings are so important. Ideas are exchanged, discussions are held, points are debated and action is taken. Democracy at its best!

School Committee Update

April 6, 2023 Meeting

Occasionally we will share updates about the content of public meetings relevant to ARC concerns. They will contain Take-a-ways for all parties as we pursue inclusion and equity through multiculturalism.

On Wednesday, several citizens spoke at the <u>School Committee meeting</u> to support Westerly ARC's request for a clear and specific code of conduct for public comments. After months of false and defamatory language directed toward ARC and individuals associated with ARC, and at the School Committee chair's suggestion, it was essential to express that the Committee consider our request as a future agenda item. Initial reflection from the Committee included reflections about civility, respect, collegiality, and confidentiality. They agreed to add the topic as a future agenda item.

Reflecting on the meeting and the opinions expressed, we offer the following take-aways:

What we hope the School Committee will do:

- 1. Communicate clear and specific expectations for public participation in School Committee meetings.
- 2. Continue open and respectful conversations with each other regarding a code of conduct.
- 3. Come to each meeting with an open mind.

What the ARC Steering Committee will continue to do:

- 1. Remain vigilant and speak out when ARC or individuals associated with ARC are personally, inaccurately, or unjustly attacked.
- 2. Be a part of the discussion to support a code of conduct at School Committee meetings.
- 3. Continue to be transparent in our work through our public Sunday gatherings, weekly newsletter, social media, and website.

What Friends of ARC can do:

- 1. Recognize that social justice work is hard and outcomes take time. Even when there is contention, keep sight of a path forward.
- 2. Do your research. Keep learning and deepen your understanding of how injustice and inequity manifest in our society.
- 3. Keep yourself well and support those under attack, especially BIPOC individuals who already carry a heavy burden doing this work and are the first to be maligned.

Westerly ARC encourages those who can to attend Westerly Town Council and School Committee meetings. Your presence and involvement is an important


way to show our elected officials that creating a more equitable and inclusive town and school system must always be a priority.

Irish Slave Myth Comparison is Divisive

Saint Patrick's Day, like many other ethnic and religious celebrations, reminds us of our multicultural and pluralistic culture. The holidays of one group become those for all. Thus, the oft-repeated phrase on March 17, "Today, everyone is Irish." We are one society

of varying socioeconomics, religions, races, gender identities, political interests, etc. But we hold it together through discourse and respect.

We can be fiercely loyal to one team, even in the contentious sports sector. At the same time, we can unconditionally love our sister, brother-in-law, or friend even though they are loyal to the opposing team. Perhaps originating with the German philosopher Hegel's preoccupation with dualism, today we know that it is often intellectually and emotionally mature, sophisticated, and healthy individually and collectively to hold two opposing views simultaneously. Psychology Today calls it "living in the messy gray." F. Scott Fitzgerald said, "The test of a first-rate intelligence is the ability to hold two opposing ideas in mind at the same time **AND** still retain the ability to function."

So, it is troubling when people or groups use comparisons to dismiss claims of inequity. In the guise of unity, sometimes, these claims are divisive tactics. The alarming comparisons all too frequently made between the immigrant experience and the imposed African diaspora of slavery are a case in point. Often, even locally, in today's discussions of equity, we hear references to "Irish Need Not Apply" as evidence that the Irish American experience in some way compares to hundreds of years and generations of African American enslavement in the US. The comparison disregards the conclusions of the 1619 Project, preponderant evidence of systematic racial inequity in American government and society, and the facts of history.

The Irish immigrant experience and the history of slavery in the US are different. Learn how they differ and how to respond to the claim, as presented in a recent Al Jazeera article. (Thank you to Geoff Serra for this contribution.)
